Dear Ms. Diehl:

The Landmarks Preservation Commission is in receipt of your environmental review request. Our recommendations pertaining to archaeological resources in the order you used are as follows:

<u>Canal Varick Laight Triangle- B 220</u> We concur that this block is unlikely to contain potentially significant archaeological resources.

<u>Washington Market Street Park Comfort Station- B 139</u> We believe that portions of the park have the potential to contain potentially significant archaeological resources and, therefore, would like further information about where the comfort station will be placed before we can opine on whether or not this project may impact archaeological resources.

<u>Collect Pond Park</u> While we concur that the majority of the site has been significantly disturbed, we were unable to tell from our maps whether or not the early 20th prison that replaced the "Tombs" would have most likely destroyed all of the earlier significant prison on the perimeter of the site or not as this area may not have been impacted by the construction of the current subsurface structure. If it did not, there is potential that the installation of the water feature pump may impact the Tombs. We therefore recommend that detailed maps of the early 20th century prison be located and used to determine if its construction would have completely destroyed the Tombs or not and that if remnants of the Tombs may still exist in the project area, that a Phase 1A be completed to further assess this potential.

James Madison Park- B 115 We concur that that this block is unlikely to contain potentially significant archaeological resources.

<u>Sara D. Roosevelt Playground- B 302</u> We concur that the Stage 1A Archaeological Assessment for the Second Avenue Subway project prepared by HPI, Inc in 2003 should be referenced in determining whether or not the impacts of this project may impact 19th century resources once the actual project impacts are known. LPC would like to be consulted about those findings.

<u>Allen and Pike Street Malls Between South Street and Broome Street</u> We recommend that a Phase 1A be completed to determine whether or not the foundations that may still be present in the park and may need to be stabilized as part of this project are potentially significant and that this research also determine what other types of archaeological resources may be in the project area and may be impacted by this project.

<u>Battery Bosque Carousel- B 3</u> If the carousel will be placed at the southern end of the park near the existing playground where there is a sign saying that spot will be the future home of the carousel, then it is unlikely that the project will impact potentially significant archaeological resources. However, if the location shifts then LPC should be consulted again about this project as portions of the park are archaeologically sensitive.
