Dear Mr. Shotzberger,

This responds to your letter dated May 8, 2006 requesting information on the presence of any federally threatened or endangered species in the vicinity of the Whitehall Ferry Terminal and Peter Minuit Plaza along the East River Waterfront in Manhattan, New York. The proposed project would involve improving a two-mile long, City-owned public open space.

While several species of listed sea turtles are known to be seasonally present in Long Island Sound and a population of the federally endangered shortnose sturgeon (*Acipenser brevirostrum*) is known to exist in the Hudson River, no listed species are known to occur in the East River where the project is located. While it is possible that the occasional transient sea turtle or shortnose sturgeon may occur in the East River, this would be a rare occurrence. As such, no further coordination with the Protected Resources Division of NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) is necessary. This responds to your May 8, 2006 (received via fax on August 1, 2006), request for information of Federally listed species in the vicinity of the proposed East River Waterfront Esplanade and Piers, Manhattan, NY.

Except for occasional transient individuals, no Federally-listed or proposed endangered or threatened species under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) are known to exist within the project impact area. In addition, no habitat in the above described project impact area is currently designated or proposed "critical habitat" in accordance with provisions of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) (87 Stat. 884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.). Therefore, no further ESA coordination or consultation with the Service is required. Should project plans change, or if additional information on listed or proposed species or critical habitat becomes available, this determination may be reconsidered. The most recent compilation of Federally-listed and proposed endangered and threatened species in New York* is available for your information. If the proposed project is not completed within one year from the date of this FAX, we recommend that you contact us to ensure that the listed species presence/absence information for the proposed project is current. Should our determination change and any part of the proposed project be authorized, funded, or carried out, in whole or in part, by a Federal agency, further consultation between the Service and that Federal agency pursuant to the ESA may be necessary.

The above comments pertaining to endangered species under our jurisdiction are provided pursuant to the ESA. This response does not preclude additional Service comments under other legislation.

In response to your recent request, we have reviewed the New York Natural Heritage Program databases with respect to an Environmental Assessment for the proposed East River Waterfront Esplanade and Piers project, area as indicated on the map you provided, located in Manhattan.

Enclosed is a report of rare or state-listed animals and plants, significant natural communities, and other significant habitats, which our databases indicate occur, or may occur, on your site or in the immediate vicinity of your site. The information contained in this report is considered <u>sensitive</u> and may not be released to the public without permission from the New York Natural Heritage Program.

This project location is adjacent to a designated Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitat. This habitat is part of New York State's Coastal Management Program (CMP), which is administered by the NYS Department of State (DOS). Projects which may impact the habitat are reviewed by DOS for consistency with the CMP. For most sites, comprehensive field surveys have not been conducted; the enclosed report only includes records from our databases. We cannot provide a definitive statement on the presence or absence of all rare or state-listed species or significant natural communities. This information should NOT be substituted for on-site surveys that may be required for environmental impact assessment.

Our databases are continually growing as records are added and updated. If this proposed project is still under development one year from now, we recommend that you contact us again so that we may update this response with the most current information.
